

Æsan's message

The Uncertainty

We live in uncertain times. A few years ago, the conflicts and tensions in Israel/Palestine were guaranteed to make front-page news. Today the multi-faceted conflicts in Syria seem in another league. Libya and Iraq along with Afghanistan are virtually failed states. Egypt and Turkey have become less attractive tourist destinations while Tunisia has become a no-go area. Not long ago Al Qaeda was the major fear for the West, but today ISIS/Daesh has been committing atrocities across Europe.

I got a glimpse of major uncertainty from a man who had been part of the rear-guard at Dunkirk in May-June 1940. After fighting on for a further fortnight they were ordered to surrender and were marched to Germany. He was on forced labour in a German power-station at 7.00 a.m. on 6th June 1944 when a German (Communist) civilian prisoner told him in a whisper that the Allies had landed in Normandy. For more than four years, incarcerated and on a sub-standard diet, he had not known when or if he would see family or home again. History is littered with uncertainties for individuals, for families and for nations. I mention these international and historical uncertainties to put into context the uncertainties we have been living with in St Ninian's.

Last October, when Paul moved on to develop his ministry in hospital chaplaincy we appreciated how far we had come under his ministry and recognised that this was a huge gap to fill. In November, when the church heating system was diagnosed to be in a terminal condition we cringed at the early quotes we were getting and recognised this meant money we did not have. Thereafter, various parts of our electrical installation were condemned as dangerous and, without urgent remedial work costing thousands of pounds, we stood to forfeit our insurance cover. As we processed through the vacancy procedure it soon became apparent that major manse upgrading work would require to be completed before we would be allowed to call a new minister.

I want to reassure members and friends of St Ninian's that we are well served by servants and office-bearers of the church who have given vast amounts of energy, time and effort to address these problems and to ordering things as circumstances require. Professional guidance has been obtained for major electrical work, heating systems and architectural matters. Consultation has taken place with Hamilton Presbytery, the General Trustees of the Church of Scotland, the Convener of the URC Synod's Finance & Property Committee and

CARTA (the Kirk's agency for Church Architecture and Art). Knowledge has been gathered of grant-giving agencies, along with their criteria and time-scales (and application forms as appropriate). The Property and Finance Committees have met frequently. A Steering Committee appointed by the Board co-ordinates their efforts. Day after day and week after week a variety of people are giving more than generously of their time, talents and energy. Organisations have been looking to their funds to find amounts that allow bits of work to be done and the process to continue.

As your Interim Moderator I feel privileged to have insight into all that is being addressed on behalf of the congregation, the community and the Kingdom of God, here in Stonehouse. I cannot guarantee we will make every deadline because much depends on outside bodies, but it will not be for lack of effort and commitment from St Ninian's personnel. So, if you are asked in the coming months to support some fund-raising efforts, please think generously.

We are in a waiting period in the vacancy procedure in that the Church Profile is advertised and we have had requests for copies, but with the deadline being the end of September it is early days for receipt of applications.

On that subject we have at the moment had five enquiries and requests for the profile but no formal applications, the closing date is the 30th September so please keep the nomination committee in your prayers.

Eric Hislop has been leading worship in church most Sundays and his services are much appreciated.

Some of our Sunday school teachers organized a Holiday Club on 8th, 10th and 12th of August and this was attended by over thirty children from P1 to P7 and what fun they had. Stewart Cutler came along and assisted and also led worship on Sunday 14th when the congregation were entertained by the children.

On behalf of the Session, I would like to thank them all for their hard work not only that week but during the year. We have a great team of folks leading our young people, the future of our church.

We have sadly had to say goodbye to some of our faithful members, Mrs Willy Hare sadly passed away on 1st July 2016, Mr Robert Mitchell has moved from Sorbie Drive to a home in Lenzie to be nearer his family and one of our elders Alison Kirkwood is moving to Moffat to be nearer her family. 

Kitega community centre in Uganda



This summer provided the opportunity for a big adventure for the Ramsay family. We spent 16 days at Kitega community centre in Uganda, helping out with the school for children with disabilities. It was a long 24 hour journey involving Bob's taxi, 2 flights and a very long car journey through heavy traffic in Kampala. We arrived in the middle of the annual VICOBA camp, which promotes and offers advice to people setting up small businesses within the local communities. The highlight of the camp is a campfire with a goat roast and the goat arrived shortly after us, alive and bleating on the back of a motorbike! Samuel and Nathanael were soon climbing trees and making friends with the local kids and it wasn't long before they were starting to learn a few words of Lugandan. Everyone was fascinated with their red hair and asked what chemicals they used to get it that colour!



The community centre fully lives up to its name and provides a school for children with disabilities during the day as well as training and support for the VICOBA groups and adult literacy classes in the evening. They also open their doors to the children in the community once the school has finished so that they can come and use the

playground. The school provides schooling for 21 children who would struggle to attend mainstream schools. They are taught numeracy and literacy as well as vocational skills such as basket weaving.

One of the main aims of the centre is to show the community that these children should be valued in their own right rather than hidden away as had previously happened. The staff at the centre



work with the families of these children to help them develop skills and businesses and use these relationships to help families develop a more positive attitude towards their disabled children.



The staff and the children at the centre love having visitors and all guests are welcomed with songs as well as given a rousing choral send-off when you are leaving. The centre is typified bv huge smiles. welcoming hugs and appreciation and delight at any contributions that are made. Samuel and Nathanael made some very good friends and Mara just loved playing with the chickens! As soon as we left the centre, the children asked when we could go back

and we are hoping to continue to build the links between Kitega and St Ninian's.

During the summer months as well as facilitating the community café within St Ninian's we delivered 2 full day, *Wellness Recovery Action Plan* (WRAP) workshops to 10 Hope Café volunteers and customers. Although the WRAP workshops main focus is on mental health recovery they are an excellent adaptable tool for anyone which encourages self-management of any life limiting condition.


