What's the story?

Years ago there was a famous advert where a particular bank declared it was "The bank that likes to say Yes!". The fact I, and probably you, remember that advert years later means it was pretty successful, but it is one of those statements that doesn't actually mean anything. I'm sure saying 'yes!' to a customer is a good experience for a banker. It means you are getting business and

experience for a banker. It means you are getting business and interest payments, but the bank in question wasn't saying that it said yes to applicants more often than other banks, just that it liked it when it did say yes.

Stories are important. Jesus told stories to help people understand what God is like and how they, and we, could live better lives. The way we talk about ourselves as a church can make a huge difference to how people think about us and what we do and who God is. It can help people to imagine themselves taking the step to join in... or not.

I wonder what story we as the community of St Ninian's Church tell about ourselves? How would we describe our church community to our family, friends and neighbours, not in some empty slogan that doesn't really mean anything, but in a story that allows people to see the truth of God's love for all of us as we stumble along, trying to follow where God leads us. Sometimes people think churchgoers are all people who have everything worked out, or a bunch of hypocrites who pretend to be holier than thou but are anything but. Perhaps we help to tell one of those stories rather than the truth. We are all just trying to make sense of our faith and do the best we can to work out our doubts and disasters.

It seems that we have a strong sense of who we are; welcoming, friendly, and a place which offers a sense of peace and hope to people, and a place to encounter God. I wonder how we can tell people that? I wonder how we can pass on the positive things we have received from taking part in all the things that happen at St Ninian's? I wonder how we pass on the story of our own encounters with God?

Mission just means telling our story about us and God. It's not much more complicated than that. It's telling the story about how God has made a difference to us and how being part of the community of St Ninian's has helped and encouraged us.

I'm looking forward to being able to tell our story to all the people I meet in Stonehouse and beyond. I hope you are excited to tell our story too.

Reflections on Flowers

We have always grown sweet peas. My husband grew named varieties from seed. As they progressed they were moved from indoors to the cold frame and then into the ground. We erected frames for them to grow on and as they grew he would cut the tendrils and attach each stem with a ring to the frame to support the plant. This meant that the tendrils did not sap the strength from the plant, nor did they catch the stem of the bloom and cause it to grow twisted and distorted instead of long and straight.

This year we did not get the seeds planted and I was unable to erect the big frame but I did want to grow sweet peas. I compromised and with help erected wig-wams and I bought plants from a garden centre.

Initially I was disappointed at my effort because the flowers were very sparse. I fed them and the rain and sun did the rest - I now have an abundance of flowers.

As I did not cut the tendrils off and ring the plants to the support, the tendrils have trapped the stems and some are bent and twisted but the flower is still beautiful and highly perfumed, others are long and straight.

This reminded me of how God loves us all no matter what shape or form we are. We are all precious to Him and beautiful in His sight just as the sweet peas are beautiful to me. As I look at them, I like to think that I'm getting a nod of approval too.

Church Meeting

On Saturday 19th August, 37 people from St Ninian's met for the day to think about who we are as a congregation and where we might want to go in future.

We began by exploring the story of Jonah, which may seem a strange place to start. We tried our best to remember the story and then read it to discover what we had missed. We found out that there isn't a whale! It's a big fish. We also found out that the story had much more in it than we had expected. God seemed to be teaching Jonah a lesson about just who was in charge, and it wasn't Jonah!

Sometimes in church we get caught up in what's known as a 'deficit' model. We look for problems and try to solve them. What if instead of looking for things we are not good at we looked for things we are good at and build on those? So, we shared our own stories, focussing on our positive experiences of St Ninian's and trying to work out if there were any common themes which linked our experiences. There were: welcome, friendship, a sense of peace and hope.


After lunch we used a tool called Ketso (which means 'action') to help us think about how St Ninian's can flourish. Our branches were 'Worship', 'Community' and 'Learning' with groups free to add another branch. They chose 'Children & Youth', 'Outreach' and 'Communication'. Our task was to put new ideas on the branches, then work out what resources we already had to make these happen and think about what else we might need and if there was anything that might cause problems.

In worship, people suggested different times and styles of service and to encourage more people of all ages to take part. In learning people were keen to have the chance to learn more about the Bible. In community we hoped to see a group for men, toddlers and perhaps a lunch club where people could learn to prepare food for their family.

These were just some of the ideas. If you have more then we'd love to hear them!

What would you love to see at St Ninian's? What resources do we already have to help do that? What else would we need? What needs might be met?
