Paus's message

Firstly, a big thankyou to everyone; for the gifts and cards that were a lovely token of where you kept us in your heart. Thank you. We are so grateful to have shared the last 12 years of our lives with you. It's something that we won't ever forget. Who I am today is shaped from my time here in song and prayer, reflection and care, in the laughter and tears



we have shared together. Thanks too for the wonderful night of my leaving doo where so many people gave of their time and talents to help say goodbye.

I'm now working away at the Royal Infirmary in Glasgow as a healthcare chaplain, which is a bit like arriving in a new country were you have to pick up the local language in order to understand and be understood. I've discovered that the NHS loves acronyms e.g. MDT (ask Margaret Patrick what that means!). The chaplaincy office is in the old part of the building right next to the original chapel which is a beautiful space for reflection. Every day is different – to say the least! But I'm enjoying the challenge and know that this is the place I should be right now.

You know those mornings, when you wake and from your bedroom window you can see that a mist, thick and grey, dresses the morning in its vapour, as if the sky can't take the weight of the clouds anymore and the ground must offer them a home. Outside the next door neighbours house has gone, the tree in the garden is a few bony branches as the village is all half shapes and suggestions, making what was once familiar seem foreign and strange. Maybe that's what it's like for you and I right now. We know well what our world looked like these past 12 years, but what will it become is still taking shape. But what hasn't changed? Who we are, made up of trust, memory, hope and fear — and this hasn't changed

either - the feet of God, as light as a feather, knows this ground, inch by inch. So what can we do, you and I, as we go into the mist? We can trust that the goodness which we've known, the generosity we have drawn on, the love that has held us together, is still the best compass through the wounds that mark us. We can with what little light we have look for the kingdom of God. How will we know when we've found it? The kingdom feels like compassion, it has the lightness to let go grudge and hold out forgiveness, it wants to share what it has; it refuses to see only the surface of a life or set of circumstances – but looks closer to find where hurt and fear masquerade as anger and strong opinion, looks beneath that to see the beauty that belongs to every person that might have been crushed between the pages of bad choices or harm done, but is still there. Lets you and I go into the misty morning of what might be and take the compass of Jesus' kingdom as our guide. We won't go far wrong with that.

If I could offer some bread for your journey I think it would be this. For the elders, your main task is to keep the peace and unity of the church — so any decision that has to be made shouldn't be based on what you want, or like as the most important criteria - but on where you think the congregation is right now and what they can cope with. For example, remember when we thought about changing communion to once a month. We felt that would be good to do (John Calvin wanted it once a week — me too!) but we also felt that perhaps there were some in the congregation who just weren't ready for that. So we decided to have it every second month — keeping the peace and unity of the church and taking a step towards what we felt was the right direction.

This doesn't mean things can't change but it keeps in mind the peace and unity of the congregation – that's the first task of eldership. For everyone, remember it is the quality of the relationships we make and keep that makes St Ninian's the church it is. That's not just the relationships with one another, but also the relationship we have with the village. Remember, we decided to take seriously how Jesus said that "it is by your love for one another all folks will recognise you as my followers"? That means sharing and caring for the congregation and the village – even when that cost us (even financially). It means getting on with those we struggle with. It allows us to hold different views (even passionately) but without spitting out the dummy. It means sometimes holding back on plans we think are right because others aren't quite there yet. Above all it means we are allowed to disagree but have conversations over those disagreements. And when things go in the direction we want we remain gracious and understanding, and when things don't go in the direction we want — we remain gracious and understanding, in relief or disappointment, because Jesus gave only one criteria for being recognised as his follower, only one: not Bible knowledge, church law, vision, conservatism, only this — love one another as I have loved you.

Okay – enough rambling from me...

Finally to say to everyone – keep praying. Remember your church in prayer. Ask God for help in the vacancy. Why not make a habit of at least once a week praying for the Session Clerk Margaret, the Kirk Session, the vacancy committee when elected, Alan the Interim Moderator, the morning preacher (soon to be Eric Hislop)— holding the whole of the life of St Ninian's before God in prayer – like a child offering a drawing to her mother, like a son offering a wound for his father to tend – offer the life of the church to the God who knows and loves this congregation. Come on, once a week. You can do that \odot

Okay, very last of all – if you are free any morning, Monday to Friday, then remember the Morning Prayer that happens in the prayer room: 9:15-9:45. That is a very special place in the life of the church, and perhaps the hearth that keeps the fire going to warm the whole of the church. It's certainly where some of the best theology is being done. Amen already!

So, this last pastoral letter comes,

With all my love, respect, hope and gratitude

And with a deep trust in the God who loves us

And in Jesus refuses to stop looking for us with that love

who holds you and invites through the mist

to where you are going to be met with wonder, wound and great, great joy.

Paul preached his last service on Sunday 4th October 2015 when he ordained three new elders and we were proud to welcome Eleanor Brown, Yvonne Hamilton and Graham Orr into the fellowship of the session and I look forward to working alongside them. Paul also welcomed nine new members - By Profession of Faith – Jennifer Clark, Louise Cooper, May Fairlie, Claire Gemmil, David Gemmil, Julie Smith and Cameron Weir and By Transfer – Sarah Jane Ramsay and Joe Park, a warm welcome to you all.

So where do we go from here you might ask, there are many hurdles to be

cleared before we even get around to calling a vacancy committee and then a minister. As you are probably aware this will not be an easy task and can I ask for your patience, support and prayers.

Rev Alan Paterson has agreed to act as Interim Moderator during our time of vacancy we have been attending meetings with folks from the United Reformed church and the Church of Scotland to clarify the way ahead. Alan will also cover two days Pastoral Care, so we still have cover for funerals, baptisms and weddings on a part time basis.

We have had various ministers lead us in worship over the last few weeks and I thank them for their support, this will continue until the end of the year then from January on Eric Hyslop has been appointed as Locum and will cover pulpit supply on a regular basis so there will be a bit of continuity on a Sunday. We are all still suffering a wee bit from shell shock but I am sure God has plans for St Ninian's.

Everyone has been saying it will be hard to find someone to fill Paul's shoes and my reply has been we will find someone who will walk in his or her own shoes, he or she might take us a different path but it will be the path that God has planned.

It is important that we all work together and support one another through this difficult but exiting time in the life of our church and our work in the village.

Session were a bit concerned at the poor attendance at the Communion on Sunday, there could be various reasons for this but we would ask that you come along when you can on a Sunday morning and support the visiting ministers.

Your church needs you.

I will endeavour to keep you up to date with all that is taking place; any information will be intimated on a Sunday morning.

Streets to pray for


In the last magazine I explained that we had started a prayer and reflection group which meets

Paul Grant - An 'Ordinary' Man

It is with a heavy heart that I write this tribute on the departure of this 'Ordinary' man, our minister and friend Paul Grant.

I write this tribute mainly as a representative of the Hope Café Lanarkshire to thank Paul for inviting, encouraging and supporting our charity to find a home within the community of St Ninian's.



I first met Paul Grant over eight years ago when I paid my first visit to St Ninian's church for a Sunday morning service.

The service was a mixture of traditions I was familiar with like hymns, bible readings and a monetary collection but the thing that struck me most, the thing I vividly remember as I sat within the congregation was listening to this `ordinary` looking, un-shaven guy called Paul Grant talking about a God that was a complete stranger to me!

To be honest during the service I thought Paul was a bit `aff his heed`, a bit radical!

Of course I didn't tell him that as I shook his hand, thanked him and quickly exited the building that Sunday morning but he had my attention.

I was curious to know more about this God he was talking about.

I continued attending Paul's services and each time I came I left comforted and up-lifted but always hungry to know more about the God Paul talked about.

Paul Grant conveys a relevant loving God who loves us all equally, unconditionally right where we are in life. He believes we are all created exactly the way we are meant to be, faults and all.

Paul Grant talks about a forgiving God who delights in every human being. A God who loves us all whether we go to church and God loves you even if you don't go to church!

Paul Grant believes in a God who sees every human being as a blessing, created exactly the way they are meant to be. No need to wait till you are 'fixed' of all your flaws and failings, no need to wait until all your questions about God have been answered, just come and engage with Him, just as you are and receive His un-conditional love.

Before I experienced one of Paul Grant's services my images of God and who He was were quite obscure.

I believed God was too great (and too busy), too far away to touch or have time for someone like me. I believed God was there to keep us religious folk in 'check' and was keeping an ever-watchful judging eye on us Christians. I viewed God as Big Brother type deity. Always watching and waiting, tut, tut tutting at all my mistakes and keeping score of all my wrong-doings and my chances of getting to heaven were pretty slim! I believed God's purpose in my life was to make me feel bad and guilty about all my failings.

Paul Grant has helped me and come to believe that God delights in who I am and loves me exactly the way I am with all my questions, faults and failings. So I come to St Ninian's and join others who have questions and we learn together about who God is by listening to the stories Paul conveys about Jesus in the Bible. Paul interprets the Bible with breath-taking simplicity and that is a special thing.

Before I came to St Ninian's and started engaging in the services I didn't feel worthy enough to call myself a Christian. I then went through a period in my life when I was trying way too hard to be a Christian but with Paul Grant's help and guidance I learned to love and accept myself just the way I am and I learned to be just me, a beloved child of God. No 'Christian' label, just Lisa.

I have had many conversations with different people in Stonehouse who have encountered Paul in some way whether they've been a guest at a wedding, funeral or a baptism that he's been celebrating or just chatting to him in the Co as a fellow human being and a common theme always emerges from these conversations. Lots of people say "Aye that Minister Paul Grant is a lovely bloke isn't he? Dead 'ordinary' just like the rest of us."

That is one of the special things about Paul he is just an `ordinary` man living out an extraordinary calling on his life. He relates to people. He really sees people and their value no matter who they are or where they are in life. He conveys love without `preaching` about God. He doesn't try to shove the `message` down peoples' throats by preaching` the message`. He has made God relevant and reachable to everyone by becoming the message.

Paul Grant has welcomed me, baptised my children, married my husband and I and most recently he has welcomed my beloved Hope Café to find a home here in St Ninian's but the greatest gift I have received from Paul is his guidance through some very dark periods in my life over the past eight years. He has enriched my spiritual journey beyond description, has been my minister and good friend who has helped me and my family grow into and understand God's love for us all and for that I thank you Paul.

So here's to this 'ordinary' man who has done extraordinary things for me, St Ninian's Church and the community of Stonehouse. The man, the minister and my friend Paul Grant.


