

I gave you an update last time on the heating in the church, at the moment we are heating the building with electric blow heaters but if we have a really cold snap we can move to the hall. Obviously this means a lot of work and it also disrupts the Sunday school and crèche hence the reason we have held back.

We are doing all we can to source some grants and I hope by the time this magazine goes to print we will have received word about a substantial grant that will allow us to start work on the heating early new year.

We also need to raise funds ourselves and I'm sorry if some folks feel we have the begging bowl out but needs must. These fundraising events not only raise money but allow us all a chance for a chat and fellowship with members and folks in the community.

You should all have received a newsletter through your door, this was a decision we took to enable us to appeal to the community, our church is used in many ways to benefit the folks in the village as well as our own members and we hoped the letter would bring them up to date with our present situation. That in simple trust and wide-eyed wonder


I may let you lead me into being that which I was born to be.




But Alex was delighted to accept God's calling. He was

From Gavin

Dear Friends of St Ninians, My main message at this time is one of sincere thanks to all of you who have supported our appeals for donations towards the Church Heating Fund. Whether you have supported us by coming to our fund raising events, sponsoring the Walkers for Heat, the Half Marathon Runners or making donations, I am very grateful to you all for your generous support.

As I write this today (06/11/2016) we have raised £ 12146.28 towards the Church Heating Fund

So far, out of the money raised we have spent £7342.01 on surveyors and architects fees which leaves us with £ 4804.27. A number of Grant applications have been submitted and some have responded favourably, but to date no money has been received. However we are awaiting details of awards from others.

The outcome of the Grant Applications will determine the balance required to cover the cost of the new heating system and allow an application to be submitted to the Church of Scotland for that amount.

In addition we are bringing the manse up to a habitable condition for a new minister. So far money has been spent on a new heating system, a repair to the alarm, painting and deposits for the new bathrooms and kitchen. The Church of Scotland has agreed a grant for manse work of £10000. The balance will hopefully be covered by a loan of £20000. The repayment of the loan will begin in 2017, the cost of which will have to be covered from our General account.

It has been a very difficult and challenging financial year and we have to look to the future when we will hopefully have a new minister guiding us in worship and in greater comfort.

I hope you will have a Happy Christmas and a safe and peaceful New Year.



New Publication Celebrating....'The Glesart'



Aloft the Avon river rests the 'the sleepv hamlet of Glesart', but travelling along the A71 to Strathaven how many venture over Glesart brig to explore the environment and historical sites that lie in abundance within this former barony and parish? Glassford, to give it its Sunday name, is full of surprises and it was whilst uncovering its story I felt compelled to recognise the villages past by writing a new publication of those who

have contributed to its development over the years and the historical events which have shaped the village.

The village of Glassford was formerly known as 'West Quarter', with further villages of 'Heads' and 'Chapelton' forming the old 'Parish of Glassford'. However for the purposes of this account the publication focuses on the village we now know simply as 'The Glesart'.

Some may know of the pre-historic standing stones that overlook the Avon waters but how many have taken the time to see them for themselves in understanding why our ancestors chose to settle in such places or appreciate the peoples beliefs and skills that encouraged them to settle in the beautiful surroundings of the Avon Valley? A parish rich in history, Glassford was where the Quakers first established themselves in Scotland in 1653, holding to their faith under persecution of other faiths, as the covenanters themselves experienced soon after. How many know that Glassford was also the site of a Napoleonic prison at Glassford castle at the beginning of the 19th century? Few I expect, but these events have shaped a community over hundreds of years in a story that deserves to be told.


From statistical accounts, national archives, local documents and personal research I have sought to recall Glassford's story in providing residents and readers with a reference and greater understanding of the area and the characters who have played their part in the villages history.
