#### Jimmy Anderson BEM

Jimmy Anderson, 88, was awarded the British Empire Medal in the Queen's Birthday Honours List earlier this year. Honours are normally presented at ceremonies in London or Edinburgh, but Jimmy asked if he could be presented with his by Vice Lord Lieutenant of Lanarkshire, John Brown, during the Sunday morning service at St Ninian's Church, Stonehouse.

The award was made to Mr Anderson, a long-time elder in the Church, in recognition of a lifetime of service to the Boys' Brigade and the local community.


Jimmy moved to Stonehouse in 1954 having been brought up in in the east of Glasgow. He married a local girl, May Thomson and joined St Ninian's Church. He was ordained an Elder while still in his early twenties, something unusual for the time.

Jimmy became an officer in the newly formed 1<sup>st</sup> Stonehouse Boys' Brigade Company and soon became Company Captain, a position he was to hold for over 60 years. His long service was recognised when he was made an Honorary Vice President of the Hamilton Battalion of the Boys' Brigade.

In his later years, he became involved in the Stonehouse Senior Citizens Group and was soon elected Chairperson. He held that position - being repeatedly voted on unanimously - for over 20 years and it was only recently that he retired from the role. The respect and admiration in which he is held, and in recognition of what he had achieved, led to him being elected Honorary President of the group and he continues to chair meetings when required.

Jimmy took up running in his 50s and in the 25 years that followed he raised funds for local and national charities including National Guide Dogs for the Blind, Stonehouse Hospital and Cancer Research. Vice Lord Lieutenant John Brown said, "This is the first time that I have had the privilege of making a presentation in front of a church congregation. It is a very special venue and most apt considering Jimmy's long and outstanding contribution to the life of the Church."

We would like to thank everyone for their custom and support this year it means so much and we wish everyone a Merry Christmas and a Happy New Year.



## **Auld Stonehouse**





#### The Barony of Stonehouse, written by John Young

Travelling up to Lanark on a regular basis you may have noticed the welcome sign as you climb the brae. This reads 'Royal Burgh of Lanark 1140', created only four years before the building of Lesmahagow Priory in 1144. This historical fact got me thinking as to when Stonehouse was created a barony and could we not as a village promote likewise our historical antiquity.

Prior to any detailed research my understanding was that the barony of Stonehouse dated around 1667 when the right of patronage of the Church of Stonehouse was vested in Lockhart of Lee, and thence to Lockhart of Castlehill. The barony and patronage is from this point well documented but for the purpose of this chapter I have concentrated my research on the early references to the Barony of Stonehouse.

The title 'Baron' is historically confusing in origin and status since its introduction to Britain in the eleventh century. The feudal system of this time incorporated the ownership of land, hereditary rights and service to the Crown. The status of Baron in the scottish feudal system was complex in determining the rights of those Barons titled by the Crown over those recognised by tenure (ownership of land). The title of Baron in feudal times gave by power of a grant, the power to hang men and drown women found guilty of capital offences by a baronial court.

A scottish Baron is a holder of an estate of land created by a direct grant from the Crown. In medieval times this could be granted by Bishops. In 2001, the Abolition of Tenure (Scotland) Act abolished the feudal system in Scotland. However 'Baronies' are still recognised in Scotland but principally in title only. Today a barony is a 'title of nobility' which can only be passed on through heritable property. In the context of Stonehouse the barony would have related to an area of land rather than specifically to the village. The Baron would have been responsible for law and order and it is likely that the village of Stonehouse developed within what was baronial land. The village as such would not have had any particular status or privileges. These belonged to the Baron as an individual.

In trying to establish when Stonehouse was first recognised as a barony I first contacted the Lord Lyon, King of Arms in Edinburgh. In replying to my request he researched the Indices to the Great Seal Register and the Privy Seal Register. In doing so the earliest reference he found as to the Barony of Stonehouse dates to a Charter of 1363, further intimating that the Barony must have existed prior to this date. With this information I sought to investigate public records and documents to establish whether or not earlier references existed.

During the 11th-13th centuries 'the Flemings' settled in Scotland from Flanders (Belgium). The Flemings were said to have been brought to Scotland by King David I as a means of feudalisation of Celtic Scotland. In return for their knightly services to the King they were given lordships, or baronies. Among those to settle in this area was 'Baldwin' a distinguished Flemish leader who settled with his followers at Biggar under a grant from David I. Baldwin was sheriff of Lanark under Malcolm IV and William I. In 1150 he was witness to a charter received from Arnald, Abbot of Kelso, land in Douglas Water and Douglas to 'Theobald Flamaticus (Fleming)' of Douglasdale. Theobald's son 'William de Fleming' was styled of 'Stanhus'. Whether or not this refers to the Barony of Stonehouse we cannot be certain. Born around 1160, William married the sister of Freskin of Kerdal, Moray and is said to have died in 1214. This is the earliest proprietor associated with Stonehouse. Between 1214-1249. Sir William the Fleming (de Douglas) of Stanhus (possibly the son of aforementioned William) appears as witness to a charter by William Purveys of Mospennoc, with Sir Archibald Douglas. The early proprietors of 'Stanhus' titled themselves 'de Douglas' in connection with this prominent family of the period.

The earliest documented evidence of the name Stonehouse dates to the Bishopic of Glasgow which was founded in 1116, to which Stonehouse is said to have continued under the diocese of Glasgow. The earliest reference I have found specifically mentioning the Barony of Stonehouse is recorded an Act of Parliament, when in 1259 an inquest was held in Dumbarton in a dispute regarding a ploughgate in the lands of Polnegulan in the Barony of Lesmahagow. Among the baronies represented was 'Stanus'. Although the owner was not mentioned the probability was that the 'Baron' was of the Douglas family.

During the reign of James II his policy of destroying the power of the Douglases and turning to the Hamiltons is borne out in Stonehouse parish. The Douglases forfeited the barony and its church passed under the power of the Hamiltons.

An account of Stonehouse in 1904 records the forbearers of the Lockharts settling in Lanarkshire about the 12th century. The author suggests that Simon Lockard and Stephen Lockard were the first of the family to have any connection with this parish. At the least, they were ancestors of the 'Lockards, proprietors of Castlehill, which formed part of the barony of Stonehouse.

In 1362 David II granted, by charter, the lands of Kittymuir to Alexander Elphystone. Alexander Elphystone thence had a charter, confirmed by David II, to Alexander, son of Sir Adam More of the whole lands of Kythumbre (Kittymuir) in exchange for land in Erthbeg. David II also granted to William, son of Maurice Murray, the forfeiture of Godfrey de Ross within the barony of Stonehouse. Chalmers' 'Caledonia' states the patronage of the parish of Stonehouse belonged to the proprietor of the barony of Stonehouse until the reign of Robert III (1390), when the church with its lands and 'tithes' (one tenth of one's income or produce paid to the church as a tax) were annexed to the collegiate Church of Bothwell by the founder Archibald 'the Grim' Douglas, Lord of Bothwell and Galloway and the Earl of Douglas, who was the then patron of the Church of Stonehouse.

In 1887 documents were located in the Hamilton Chamberlain's office which recorded the following extract, stating the significance of Cat (Cot) castle to the Hamilton family. The document reads; In a charter granted by himself "Alexander Hamilton of Cat castell passed to the one-mark land of Woodland and the half-merk land of Brownland, lying in the barony of Stanehouse and sheriffdom of Lanark and there gave sasine of these lands with his own hands to James Wynzet, his heirs and assignees in usual form 29th January, 1511-12".

Chalmers states that the old Parish Church formerly situated in New Street (demolished in 2006) was built in 1772 and stands in the town of Stonehouse, which was created a burgh of barony. This provided the right to hold a weekly market on a Wednesday and hold three annual fairs by the charter to Sir James Lockhart of Lee in 1667, which was ratified by Parliament in 1669.

The last mention I have found relating to the Barony of Stonehouse is recorded in Robert Naismith's book of 1885 dedicated to "Major-General Graeme Alexander Lockhart C.B. of Castlehill and Cambusnethan, Lord of the Barony of Stonehouse and Depute Lieutenant of the County of Lanark".

We may never know the date on which Stonehouse was recognised as a barony. Alas records have been lost or destroyed through the passing of time. What we can assert is that Stonehouse is among the oldest parishes in Scotland of which the title 'Barony' predates 1259 possibly as old as

1160.

In establishing these facts we can assert our antiquity whilst seizing the opportunity to promote our historical past both to residents and visitors. In doing so we can instill a sense of pride in our village while encouraging greater awareness and understanding of our own ancestry.


