The Leprosy Mission - Scotland Update

I am glad to have the chance to get in touch with you all in our first Link Magazine for some time. The following is an extract from the ASK 2021 Prayer Diary, written by the International Director of the Leprosy Mission.

"Dear praying friends and colleagues

The Covid-19 pandemic has brought huge change to our world and the way we live our lives. While it has affected us, it has been devastating for the poor and, in particular, people and families who are living with leprosy. Like all disasters, be they natural or manmade, the poor are always impacted the most.

While Covid-19 has brought about unique times, they are not unprecedented. Since The Leprosy Mission was founded in 1874, there have been two world wars, a great depression, a pandemic that killed tens of millions of people (Spanish Influenza of (1918-19), and famines that have killed millions. Throughout the last 150 years, be they good times or otherwise, we have remained a Mission committed to prayer and our Lord and Master has always provided for the Mission and those we serve."

Brent Morgan, the International Director, then went on to say thank you for the support we continue to give. It is greatly appreciated.

The last time we were able to send money away was at the beginning of 2020. I have received a few leprosy mission boxes to empty and return this year so we do have some money to send but, if you could please get any boxes or donations to me during December I will get it sent away as soon as possible. Evidently one person is diagnosed with leprosy every two minutes with more than 50% of all new leprosy cases in India.

Thank you again to everyone for their continued support with this project.
