'I rejoiced when they said to me, let us go to the house of the Lord!' But where to when the house is shut? Into the world, for the whole earth belongs to the Lord.

This is Pentecost. Today we give thanks for the gift of the Spirit. So, let us worship God and let us go into all the world.

Whose birthday is it?

It's the church's birthday.

How can a building have a birthday?

The church is people, not a building.

Holly's right, it's not the building we're celebrating, it's the church, that's not just 100 years ago, we're celebrating the church's birthday and it's a time called Pentecost. And at Pentecost we remember the day that the church really got started and that, and on this day, over 2,000 years ago, the disciples, and a whole bunch of people were in a room. And suddenly, there was this wind that came through the room and they realised that is was the Holy Spirit that was in the room with them, giving them the tools and the knowledge of how to do the things that Jesus had asked them to do.

Do you remember a couple of weeks ago, when we were in church, we talked about Jesus saying that He would leave us something, the Holy Spirit, after He left, remember that one? So, Holly, can I have the balloon a minute? Think of that balloon, it's, just now it's not much of a balloon is it? It's lifeless, it's not getting anything in it, but when you blow in it, it suddenly has power and purpose and that's a bit like the Holy Spirit, that the Holy Spirit gives us the power and the purpose to do the things that God wants us to do. Then, if you imagine a birthday candle, the disciples suddenly saw that there were tiny, little flames above each of their heads in that room, as well as the Holy Spirit being in that room. And they knew at that point that they had work to do. And that work's still going on 2,000 years later, yes, in buildings, but all over the world. Because people believe that the

Holy Spirit's giving us everything we need to be the church wherever we are. So let's get our party poppers, right, you ready?

So there's only one thing left to do then, let's sing "Happy Birthday".

I love the hills and the mountains. And to be clear, I'm talking about the Scottish mountains. Why bother about the rest, when we've got the best! And some of those mountain areas of Scotland, I've become very familiar with through the years from repeated visits. not least the Angus Glens and the mountains around them. I know them inside out, particularly Glen Doll and one of the Munros at the top of Glen Doll.

It's called Driesh, I've climbed it 19 times. I've been up it in the depths of winter and in the heights of summer. I've been up it in the middle of the night and in the day. I know its every turn and its every aspect. That mountain, I am so familiar with and I love it because of that.

But just as much, I love exploring new territory. Going to parts of the country I've never been to before. Yes, exploring, discovering, finding new landscapes. Now, when I go to new places, I'm much more dependent on my map and my compass for navigating. It's a comfort to me to be able to guide myself on the map. Or maybe I'm out walking and I come across a path or maybe some muddy footprints, and that's a great comfort too, to know that others have been here before you.

But what about if we're called to completely new territory? Where there is no map and compass to help us, to go to undiscovered country? The reality is that there's hardly a place on earth now that hasn't been discovered, I guess that's why I love reading so much about the early explorers. One of my favourite books is about the first Europeans to go to Everest and to try to conquer it. I love reading too about Shackleton and those who went to the Poles and to the Antarctic - endeavouring, seeking out. There's not much opportunity for that nowadays, but even still, we can take ourselves out of our familiar places. This is one of the best books I've read of late, it's called "The Call Of The Wild." It's about a man who went to live for a year in the depths of the Alaskan tundra and forest.

I wonder if perhaps that's what's being asked of us right now as the church? That we need to, yes, go beyond all that is familiar, to hear again something of the call of the wild, to go beyond what's known and dear?

For many of us this causes us all kinds of anxiety. We're far better when we know exactly what's happening. In terms of church, Sunday mornings, going down to our buildings, running our services according to patterns we've used for long enough, meeting together in our various groups and organisations and in the pastoral life of the church, visiting one another in our homes and so on.

So with everything being so different, we find ourselves very disorientated, not quite sure of the landscape, not quite sure of ourselves. Our deepest longing is to get back to what we know.

And all of this, we begin to get a glimpse into the experience of how it's always been for God's people. Think of those Israelites after crossing the Red Sea and after a period of time in the wilderness, it was so disorientating and so unfamiliar to them, the demands were so great they actually wanted to go back, even though it

would've been back into captivity! Or long before that, Abram. Listen to the beginning of chapter 12 of Genesis, "The Lord said to Abram, "'Leave your country, your relatives, "'and your father's home, "'and go to a land that I am going to show you.'" Of course he had no idea where that was, what it was going to be like, let alone how to get there. And then those first disciples when Jesus came to them, met them on the beach at Galilee, He asked them to leave everything that was familiar and to come with Him to become fishers of people. And then the apostle Paul and so many others, risking all for the Gospel. Even up until much more recent times of church history, missionaries from Scotland, like David Livingstone, going into unknown territory. Or what about Mary Slessor? Born in Aberdeen and raised in Dundee, and then off under the call of God to Nigeria and what a work it was she was involved in there.

Mission is still where it's at. The only difference is, we don't have to go anywhere. It starts right on our doorstep! Friends, we've got to rediscover that essential calling to mission. Here's the thing. It's going to take something of a makeover. Maybe much more than that, a reformation, for us to be in the kind of shape we need to be to be the church for mission and Scotland and beyond in the 21st Century.

For starters, we're going to have to learn to travel much more lightly. To lay down so much of the baggage that we're carrying. When I first started out in my hill walking journeys, I used to take everything with me. I had such big packs that I could hardly walk, never mind hike around and then of course I had to learn that you don't need the kitchen sink with you everywhere you go! Now I'm perfectly happy with just a small pack like this.

When Jesus called and sent His disciples, this is what He said to them. He sent them out two by two and He ordered them, "Don't take anything with you on the trip, except a walking stick. No bread, no beggar's bag, no money in your pockets, wear sandals, but don't carry an extra shirt."

What are we going to have to learn to lay down? What baggage are we going to leave behind us? And how are we going to find our way?

Like never before, we're going to have to trust in and depend on God. He's always been there, and He will guide us. "Your word, Lord is a lamp to guide me and a light for my path." Can we trust that to be true? God will lead us by His word and by His Spirit. And today we rejoice in the gift of the Spirit. The Spirit that has gone before God's people in every time and place, the Israelites through the wilderness, though they knew not that territory, had a pillar of cloud before them in the day and a fire by night. And those first apostles, trusting in the Spirit, knowing that at times, doors would be closed to them and at other times opened for them. And what about those saints of old, who first came to these shores of ours, bearing the Gospel, trusting in the blowing of the wind to bring them where God would have them be.

And now, will we be ready to go where God is leading us? Will we allow ourselves to be remade, remodelled into the kind of church God needs us to be now? Will we

allow for that reformation, for that revival? And at this time of Pentecost for the refreshing?

Will we pray, Spirit lead me where my trust is without borders, let me walk upon the waters wherever You will lead me? Will we believe His word? This God is our God forever and ever. He will lead us for all times to come.

Church, this is our shot, this is our opportunity. Let's do it and let's do it in the name of the Father and the Son, and in the power of His Holy Spirit. Amen.
